With an estimated 212,920 new cases of breast cancer expected to be diagnosed in the U.S. this year alone, according to the American Cancer Society, it is no wonder that talk among women often includes updates on female friends, neighbors and family who have the disease. "My sister and I were talking one day about all of

the friends we have who've had breast cancer and wishing there was something we could do," Venneman Cooper says. "She came up with the idea of using my pink chair to raise money." The pink chair in question

is the Clementine, one of four chairs in the Ferme Chic collection designed by Venneman Cooper. The feminine chair collection, which debuted in 2003, was inspired by Venneman Cooscrabble Texas Panhandle, always managed to look styl-

contemporary chairs in the collection is named for a glamorous woman whom Venneman Cooper encountered while growing up on the 100year-old Venneman family cattle ranch down a dirt road from her grandmother's place. The modern style of the chairs is accented by luxurious fabrics in lush colors pulled from the Texas landscape: Flourishing Soil, a rich, chocolate brown velvet; Blue Sky, a pale blue suede; Ripening Wheat, a golden silk dupioni; and Prairie Pink, a soft, muted silk It was the pink silk Clementine chair that was the inspira-

tion for the partnership with the Breast Cancer Research Foundation, an organization founded by Evelyn Lauder to raise funds for research in the hopes of eradicating the disease. For every pink Clemen-tine chair sold, Venneman Cooper plans to donate 20 percent of the proceeds to the foundation. 'We thought that the pink

chair would be a wonderful symbol of survival or remembrance for people who have either lost a loved one to breast cancer or are battling breast cancer. It is a special chair and is such a nice thing for someone to have in her home," says Venneman Cooper. "I chose to give money to the Breast Cancer Research Foundation because a large percentage of their donations [90 cents for every dollar do-

nated] goes directly to finding

All of the chairs are handmade by a master craftsman according to Venneman Cooper's specifications and take about six to eight weeks to complete.
